Growing Well Cincinnati, formerly Health in Schools, is a collaborative of providers, parents, and community leaders working to improve the health and well-being of Cincinnati children and their families. As the Cincinnati Public School (CPS) district plans and builds Community Learning Centers in city neighborhoods, it is essential to understand the health and social issues that face each community. *Growing Well Cincinnati's* mission is to create an integrated, coordinated, and sustainable system that insures access to quality health and wellness services for students and their families.

The Child Policy Research Center at Cincinnati Children's Hospital was contracted to develop health and well-being profiles on 15 city neighborhoods and 16 CPS schools. Measures of population health and well-being were collected from a variety of local and regional sources. Information included diverse items such as childhood chronic conditions, birth outcomes, Medicaid eligibility, and mental health visits to the hospital emergency department.

Local area and school-specific data are presented to *Growing Well Cincinnati* in order to develop a coordinated approach to improving the quality of life for city children and families. The profiles illustrate a need for comprehensive health and social services in Cincinnati neighborhoods.

BOND HILL Key Findings

- Prematurity often leads to life-long handicapping health conditions. In Bond Hill, 15% of neighborhood births in 2003 were premature.
- More than one in three children in Bond Hill lived in poverty in 2000.
- One in nine older teens has failed to complete high school.
- Over half of children live in single-parent families.
- Four out of five children at Bond Hill Academy were classified as "economically disadvantaged" in the 2005/2006 school year.
- Nearly 15% of Bond Hill Academy kindergarteners are overweight or at-risk for being overweight.

- Approximately 30% of children younger than 18 had no parent in the workforce living with them.
- Nine out of ten children at Central Fairmount School were classified as "economically disadvantaged" in the 2005/2006 school year.
- Nearly 40% of Central Fairmount kindergarteners are overweight or at-risk for being overweight.

Riverview East Academy

Woodford Paideia

Growing Well Cincinnati, formerly Health in Schools, is a collaborative of providers, parents, and community leaders working to improve the health and well-being of Cincinnati children and their families. As the Cincinnati Public School (CPS) district plans and builds Community Learning Centers in city neighborhoods, it is essential to understand the health and social issues that face each community. *Growing Well Cincinnati's* mission is to create an integrated, coordinated, and sustainable system that insures access to quality health and wellness services for students and their families.

The Child Policy Research Center at Cincinnati Children's Hospital was contracted to develop health and well-being profiles on 15 city neighborhoods and 16 CPS schools. Measures of population health and well-being were collected from a variety of local and regional sources. Information included diverse items such as childhood chronic conditions, birth outcomes, Medicaid eligibility, and mental health visits to the hospital emergency department.

Local area and school-specific data are presented to *Growing Well Cincinnati* in order to develop a coordinated approach to improving the quality of life for city children and families. The profiles illustrate a need for comprehensive health and social services in Cincinnati neighborhoods.

KENNEDY HEIGHTS Key Findings

- Prematurity often leads to life-long handicapping health conditions. In Kennedy Heights, 12% of neighborhood births in 2003 were premature.
- More than one in three children in Kennedy Heights lived in low-income families in 2000.
- One in eight older teens has failed to complete high school.
- Over two out of five children live in single-parent families.
- Three out of five children at Woodford Paideia were classified as "economically disadvantaged" in the 2005/2006 school year.
- Nearly 20% of Woodford Paideia kindergarteners are overweight or at-risk for being overweight.
